

Autism Diagnostic Assessment: Interactions with Your Child

- A clinician should document observations of your child's interactions with you and with the clinician.
- A clinician should interact directly with your child.
- These observations and interactions provide the clinician the opportunity to observe the behaviors that are important to see when determining if a child has Autism:
 - Communication
 - Social Interaction
 - Play



Autism Diagnostic Assessment: Interactions with Your Child

- In addition to informal interactions, the clinician should also use a diagnostic tool to further evaluate the signs and symptoms of Autism. This should include one or more of the following:
 - Autism Diagnostic Observation Schedule, Second Edition (ADOS-2)
 - Childhood Autism Rating Scale, Second Edition (CARS-2)
 - Gilliam Autism Rating Scale (GARS) Parent report
 - Autism Spectrum Rating Scale (ASRS)
 - Social Responsiveness Scale (SRS), Parent Report
 - Social Communication Questionnaire (SCQ), Parent Report



Evaluation Findings and Recommendations

- Results of the evaluation, including whether your child qualifies for an Autism diagnosis, will be discussed with you.
- Some clinics provide same-day feedback while others schedule a follow-up appointment.
- Feedback should include:
 - Developmental recommendations
 - Educational recommendations
 - Autism-specific recommendations
 - Medical needs/follow-up care (feeding, sleeping, genetics)
- A comprehensive evaluation report should be mailed within 1 month of your appointment.



Diagnostic Considerations

Autism should never be diagnosed based on one source of information, one symptom, or due to the results of one diagnostic tool in isolation (e.g., ADOS-2).

Autism diagnoses should be provided based on the findings from a comprehensive evaluation described today.
